The Real Gang Busters - Norfolk Detectives Benny Serrano and Richard Creamer

There are approximately 67 gangs in Hampton Roads

A 20 minute video was shown to the membership. It depicted the issues that youth have that might make them turn toward gang activity. It seems attractive in the beginning but becomes more difficult and demanding as time goes on. Gangs can offer friendship, peer acceptance, protection, money, belonging and family. Norfolk gangs are not without their influence on our community and our children.

It is not illegal to belong to a gang. Consequently, the existence of gangs cannot be stopped. What we can do as parents and neighbors, is to keep our eyes open. Some of the signs of children involved in gang activity might be unusual hand signs, drastic change in clothing, wearing the same colors consistently, anxiety, change in closeness to family, listlessness, possessing unexplained money or goods, being disrespectful, and a change in friends. ### Sales Tax Holiday for energy-saving products Oct. 8-11

Virginia's fourth Energy Star and WaterSense products sales tax holiday will begin Friday, October 8th and continue through Monday, October 11th. During the holiday, consumers can purchase a variety of "Green" products qualified for energy savings by the federal government and not pay the 5% state and local sales tax.

The products must cost \$2,500 or less each and be purchased for noncommercial or personal use. The Energy Star products include many larger items, such as air conditioners, refrigerators, dishwashers, ceiling fans, and washing machines, as well as compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) and programmable thermostats.

WaterSense-labeled bathroom sink faucets, faucet accessories, and toilets will also be tax-exempt, along with new items added to the list this year such as showerheads. The sales tax exemption also applies to purchases of *used* Energy Star and WaterSense items that qualify.

### Northside Skate Plaza to Open October 2<sup>nd</sup>

After three years of anticipation, the City of Norfolk cut the ribbon on Northside Skate Plaza on Sat., Oct. 2.

Mayor Paul D. Fraim, Councilwoman Alveta V. Green and Councilwoman Dr. Theresa W. Whibley addressed the audience at the 11:30 a.m. ribbon cutting. Directly following were demonstrations by skate teams from Mike's Sk8 Park, Sole Brothers Shoe & Skate, Mekos, Anti-Gravity and 17<sup>th</sup> Street Surf Shop, as well as entertainment by bands Holly Would, O.C.D and The Sacred Code. Several skating-related vendors were also on-site.

Larchmont resident Adam Stant, 18, now a freshman at Virginia Tech initiated the skate park concept with a petition drive with the encouragement of his mother. Stant and other skate park supporters began lobbying City staff and City Council in 2006, resulting in a feasibility study. The skate park gained public momentum, and in August 2008 the City Council approved Northside Park as the skate park site and funded the \$850,000 project over three



years.

The Norfolk Dept. of Recreation, Parks and Open Space held two public charrettes in November 2008 and January 2009 and circulated a survey in order to garner citizen input on the

skate park's design. Construction began in January.

Northside Skate Plaza features mostly solid concrete construction ; double L-shaped bowls of 7 ft and 9 ft depth

### Planning underway for RIVERFest-Lafayette River Celebration

Over a year ago, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and the Elizabeth River Project brought together a multidisciplinary group of public and private experts as well as citizens to start talking about how to help the Lafayette River. This Steering Group developed a watershed plan with three main parts: a swimmable, fishable Lafayette; a healthy river life; and citizens making a difference. The draft Lafayette River Watershed Plan is being reviewed and hopefully will be endorsed by the Norfolk City Council within the next few weeks. The strategic goal is a swimmable, fishable Lafayette River by 2014.

Since Suburban Acres is situated on and drains directly into the North Branch of the Lafayette, the neighborhood is considered an important part of this city-wide effort.

Planning is underway for a one day celebration of the Lafayette River – RIVERFest on the Lafayette on Saturday 30 April 2011 (rain date 1 May 2011). Organizers hope the spring celebration will evolve into an annual river appreciation day. Think block party with food, music, arts, the Elizabeth River Project's Learning Barge, education tables and activity tents. The Steering Group has met with Colonial Place neighborhood residents and their civic league and they support the plan. The location will be the 500 block of Mayflower Road – a prime location along the Lafayette River. They will begin working with the City of Norfolk for permits and permission to temporarily close that block on April 30, 2011.

The plan is to ask school choirs and local musicians to volunteer their time and talent. Also we are asking for local artists

(photographers, painters, sculptors, potters, etc.) to display their pieces. More information will be forthcoming throughout the fall, winter and spring. Currently the Elizabeth River Project has basic RIVERFest information on their web site, [www.elizabethriver.org](http://www.elizabethriver.org) under events.

Abry Cox from Lafayette River RIVERFest is the featured speaker at the October 11<sup>th</sup> Suburban Acres Civic League meeting. Due to the subject matter, this is considered an EARNN (Environmental Awards for Recycling in Norfolk Neighborhoods) presentation, and the civic league will receive points towards its EARNN goal if at least 30 adults attend the presentation.

## SUBURBAN ACRES GREEN

Happy New Year! Did you know that October 1 starts the new water year? "Water Year" is a term used by hydrologists to define the stream flow in rivers over a period of a year. Hydrologists are scientists who study the water cycle – how water moves between rivers and lakes, the groundwater, and the atmosphere. In the U.S., the water year starts in October because that is generally when the low flow period of late summer ends and autumn rains start to replenish rivers and lakes.

So why is the water cycle important? As we all know, water is the stuff of life on which we depend. Our bodies are 60% water and we quickly die without water. While the overall amount of water on the planet doesn't change (we are drinking the same water the dinosaurs did), the amount of freshwater is quite limited. Of all the earth's water, 97% is salty and 2% is frozen, leaving only 1% available to us, and for the fish and other aquatic life that also need freshwater to live. That's not much water to take care of the 6 billion people on earth.



The average American uses about 100 gallons of water a day in our homes – or 146,000 gallons per year for a family of four. Most of our household water goes to flush toilets and for baths and showers. But we use water in many other ways. About 40% of water use in the U.S. is for generating

electricity (steam generation and cooling), and another 40% is used in agriculture. Your burger, fries and soft drink required about 1500 gallons of water to produce – enough water to fill a small swimming pool! The pair of jeans and a shirt you bought took about 800 gallons of water.

In the U.S., we have an abundance of clean water, but much of the rest of the world is not so lucky. There are many water shortages and conflicts around the globe. In fact, the U.S. military has identified water conflicts and global climate change as two of the most significant threats to international security.

Norfolk's water system treats about 72 million gallons a day and serves over 820,000 people. Our water comes from a number of small lakes around the region and from four groundwater wells in Suffolk. Some of our water is even piped from Lake Gaston and the Nottoway River, over 70 miles away.

Because freshwater is such a precious and limited resource, there are a number of things we can do to reduce our use. Fixing plumbing leaks is important since 6% of water in an average home is lost to leaks. Look for new appliances with the "Water Sense" label, which means they have been designed to use less water. In the shower, install a water reduction aerator and turn off the water while soaping up. Turning off the water while brushing your teeth will save 3 gallons a minute. Install a rain barrel to collect water from your roof to water outside plants. Better yet, reduce the size of your lawn so you don't have to water so much. Less lawn also means less time mowing – and we all have better things to do than mow the lawn!
