Harris Teeter is in

The president of Matthews, N.C.-based Harris Teeter confirmed Wards Corner will be the home of the grocer's second Norfolk location at an afternoon ceremony on Friday April 27th at the development site, the Southeast corner of the Little Creek Road / Granby Street intersection.

Developer Chris Perry of Suburban Asset Management has said all along that the high-end grocer would be the development's anchor tenant, but Harris Teeter would not commit to signing a lease until the necessary city planning commission approvals and rezoning ordinances were finalized and approved by City Council, which occurred in a joint City Council-Planning Commission meeting on Tuesday April 24th.

In addition to acting city Director of Development Chuck Rigney city council persons Barclay Winn, Angelia Williams, Tommy Smigiel, and Andy Protogyrou were in attendance. Winn and Protogyrou, who represent Wards Corner, spoke at the ceremony.

Perry introduced Harris Teeter President Fred Morganthall, who said the grocer loves Norfolk and looks forward to doing more business here. Mortanthall said the location would be a "flagship" store and offer fresh already-prepared and made to order items, fresh seafood, and a deli with dine-in area at the new 53,000 square foot store, projected to open in early 2014.

Morganthall pointed out Rick Burnell of Atlantic Commercial Real Estate Services in the crowd, crediting Burnell for bringing the Wards Corner site to Harris Teeter's attention and for persistently selling the area, as well as Norfolk.

Both the Wards Corner and Suburban Acres Civic Leagues are in support of the project, and provided letters of support to the developer and planning commission. Both leagues asked that the developer incorporate elements of nearby Norfolk Collegiate School and Granby High school into the new center's brickwork and architecture, and emphasized a quality redevelopment job was essential since it will likely be 30-40 years or more before the site is again redeveloped.

The Suburban Acres Civic League also asked that landscaping and design elements be utilized to improve the appearance of or screen the rear of the new shopping center, which will be visible from homes on Louisiana Drive and Virginian Drive.

Demolition will begin within the next 30-60 days; the A.J. Gators restaurant closed after a farewell celebration on April 28th.

The Perry family has owned the site since the area first started to be developed in the 1940's, and opened the 5 & 10 cent store that grew into the nationwide Dollar Tree retail chain.

Barclay Winn sails to 4th term

Incumbent Superward 6 councilman Barclay Winn swept the polls to a victory in the May 2nd election, propelling him to a fourth term on city council. Outspending three opponents by 4:1 Winn outpolled his Barclay Winn closest challenger by a margin of 2:1.

While cleaning up in Northeast Norfolk neighborhoods like Bayview and Ocean View (winning 6 precincts there), challenger John Amiral earned 28 percent of the vote to Winn's 49%.

It was noted late in the campaign that while Amiral claimed to be a business owner with a tax and consulting service located in Ocean View, he had listed | Total Votes the address of a vacant building in campaign reports. The Virginian Pilot reported in April that Amiral said the

business was "on hold". Challenger Jesse Scaccia also noted that the Virginia Public Access Project tracked the majority of Amiral's campaign contributions to Northern Virginia and the Chicago area.

Winn did well in downtown and West side neighborhoods like Larchmont and Ghent, as well as the Wards Corner area. Winn has been an active proponent for redevelopment in Wards Corner and founding member of the Wards Corner task force. Despite winning Winn's outcome can't be called a landslide: this is the first election in which Winn did not win an outright majority of the votes.

More projects add to Wards Corner resurgence

The Virginia Pilot reports in an April 15th article by Carolyn Shapiro that the Wards Corner Farm Fresh will begin renovations this month

A spokesman for Farm Fresh parent Supervalu, Inc. says the renovations are not connected to the new Harris Teeter grocery planned to anchor a new shopping center on the Perry Property down the street on the Southeast corner of the intersection of Granby Street and Little Creek Road, and that plans for the Farm Fresh upgrade have been on the drawing board for some

According to documents submitted to the city Farm Fresh will undergo \$2 million of upgrades affecting the interior and exterior of the store.

Also in April seven Denby Park apartment buildings in the 300 block of San Antonio Blvd. were razed after the city acquired the property for \$2.7 million. The Virginian Pilot quoted Wards Corner Civic League president Jim English who said, "It rids the area of apartments that have been notorious for high crime." English added that the "dysfunction of the neighborhood has been coming out of those apartments."

The 2003 Greater Wards Corner Comprehensive Plan identified the "Texas streets" area of Denby Park as being the most crimeridden in the Wards Corner area, having a destabilizing effect of the neighborhoods around it. According to the comprehensive plan, the area was "an ideal environment for drug-dealing that has attracted criminal elements from the whole Hampton Roads area and beyond."

Great American Cleanup spruces up Norfolk

On Saturday, April 28, volunteers spread out across Norfolk as part of the Great American Cleanup. The work accomplished was astounding; here are just some the numbers:

- 650 volunteers participated (1760 volunteer hours)

The civic league earned 5 points toward the Environmental Rewards for Recycling in Norfolk Neighborhoods (EARNN) competition, which nets cash prizes to neighborhoods for recycling and other sustainability activities.

May—Termites, Mold, and Moisture: A Bad Trio!

Despite all the good things about living in Hampton Roads, we live in an area of the country that has high levels of termites and mold. Blame that on the relatively warm year round temperatures, high humidity and rainfall.

In nature, termites serve a vital function as decomposers that break down fallen trees and limbs and return wood to the soil.

But the wood in our homes, and especially wood that is moist, can be easy pickings for termites. Subterranean termites cause the most structural damage in our area. They live in underground colonies and enter structural wood via mud shelter tubes that they build to keep moist. Termites will even tunnel through insulation to find wood. They feed constantly, but their presence is seldom noticed until damage is severe or the termites swarm inside a building.

Mold and mildew are generic terms used to describe a variety of species of fungus that eat organic materials (wood, paper, fabric, leather, paint, etc.). These fungi can grow quickly in areas that have been submerged during floods. Mold and mildew can also grow in houses, crawl spaces

and attics where there are water leaks or high humidity. For people who are highly allergic to mold spores, the presence of mold can be life threatening.

Luckily, there are things homeowners can do to prevent both termites and mold. Not all preventative measures are cheap, but good home maintenance is cheaper than the alternative – replacing structural wood and drywall is expensive.

Here's how to keep those termites, mold and moisture away:

- Make sure the ground around the foundation slopes away from buildings so that rain water drains away.
- Repair leaks in roofs, plumbing and gutters. Fill and caulk cracks and holes that lead into or under the house, including utility lines and plumbing.
- Clean out gutters and downspouts at least once a year to prevent water from getting into roof soffits and attics.
 Downspouts should not empty close to the foundation – or add rain barrels to make use of that water.
- Maintain wood siding and trim in good repair replacing worn caulk and keeping wood painted will help repel both termites and mold.
- Do not store wood close to the house and remove any wood or other organic materials from crawl spaces.
 Firewood should be stored on a raised platform well away from the house.
- Keep mulch, trees and shrubs away from the foundation. An open area of several feet between the house and plantings will allow good air circulation and make inspections easier. Do not allow sprinklers or drip irrigation systems to soak exterior walls or foundations.

 When building new structures (fences, sheds, porches, etc.), there should be no wood-to-ground contact. All wood posts (even pressure treated) should be embedded in concrete or set in galvanized post holders. New buildings should have the required termite barriers.

Inspect your house once or twice a year (and after bad storms) for signs of termites, leaks and mold. Use binoculars to look at the roof to make sure shingles are in place, then go into the attic to look for signs of leaks or mold. Check around the foundation and in the crawl space for termite mud tubes, wet areas, or damaged wood. Inside the house, look for spongy floors, bubbling paint or drywall, or sawdust. Especially in spring, look for piles of tiny wings, particularly around windows — a sign of termite swarms. Mold and mildew show up as black, brown, green, yellow or red areas on wood, walls, and fabric and should be promptly removed.

If inspections under your house are more than you

can handle, or if you see signs of termites, then a call to a professional pest control company is warranted. Pest control companies will check for moisture problems while under your house. There are hundreds of pest control companies in our area. To make sure you use one that is reputable, check with the Better Business Bureau.



Strawberry Fruit Congeal

1 (4 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.) carton Cool Whip 1 cup water

1/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup chopped pecans

1 (3 oz.) package cream cheese, softened

1 small can crushed pineapple, drained

1 regular size pkg. Strawberry Jello

Fresh strawberries (about 1 cup when sliced)

Bring water to a boil with sugar and pineapple. Add Jello, stir until well dissolved. Put in an 8 X 8 or 9 X 9 dish and cool. Let set until it begins to congeal (about 1 hour). Fold in Cool Whip, pecans, cream cheese and strawberries. Chill until firm.

Serve on crisp lettuce leaf with a dab of cool whip and a strawberry on top of each salad.

Note: I add about 1/2 package of additional Jello to make it

firmer.
