Greater Wards Corner Task Force meets in September after summer break

The meeting was led by The Greater Wards Corner Task Force returned from a summer hiatus to several development updates and reports by city staff and surrounding neighborhoods on September 13th. The meeting was led by Councilman Andy Protogyrou, with council persons Theresa Whibley and Barclay Winn also present.

Charles Rigney of the Department of Development reports that Suburban Park Shopping Center development is moving along, with Harris Teeter's lease signed. Letters of intent are in place for all spaces in the new shopping center except one space at the south end. The out-parcel (corner of Granby Street and Louisiana Drive) building will be filled by Towne Bank. On Granby Street at Louisiana there will be a new left turn lane and stop light heading southbound; there will be two turn lanes on Louisiana. The City is paying for these traffic improvements.

Across the street at the Mid-Town Center Shopping Center Mrs. Dallis did not reach an agreement with Dollar Tree, so there will be no store in the renovated shopping center. The owner of the gas station is looking for offers to sell but it is unclear what might go there. Mrs. Dallis is not interested in purchasing the property. The 7-11 company expressed interest in the site, but based on preliminary discussions with surrounding neighborhoods the city does not think the public would want a 7-11 in that location.

The 7-11 Corporation is looking to move and upgrade a number of corporate owned stores in the region, including the store on the southwest side of Wards Corner. The City is trying to help find an appropriate new location for the store. Discussions continue with potential developers of the Work Force Center property. The Guads restaurant (old AJ Gators and Wards Corner Pub location) should be open in early October.

John Keifer and Ann Kelly from the Department of Public Works said three options were being considered for for placing the

utilities underground on the Southeast corner of Wards Corner. Option 1 would put the utilities underground along the southeast side of Granby Street and Little Creek Road for \$160,000. Option 2 would also include the entire perimeter of the shopping center (adding in Louisiana Drive and Virginian Avenue frontages) for \$2,900,000. Option 3 would also include the northeast side of Little Creek (Mid-Town Shopping Center) from Granby to Virginian for \$3,600,000.

Task Force members agreed that putting the utilities underground along Louisiana and Virginian was not a priority, nor was the north side at the present time. Option 1 will be requested as a Capital Improvement Project in the City's 2013 budget since the cost is reasonable and it makes sense to do the project while the entire corner is under construction. Public Works was requested to go back and determine the cost of doing the north-east corner along Granby Street and Little Creek Road for future consideration.

There is still \$2 million budgeted by the City for the redevelopment of the area. The group agreed that the redevelopment of blighted areas of the greater Wards Corner area is a priority over placing the utilities underground.

In other community reports at the Task Force meeting, Karen Mayne reported that there is a need for a larger and reconfigured bus port at Suburban Park Elementary since school buses back up on Thole Street, and there is a problem with soil erosion at the front of the school. Council representatives asked the Public Works department to work on an engineering plan for the bus port that could be submitted as a Capital Improvement Project in the next year's budget.

Jim McDonnell reported that Talbot Hall (owned by the Episcopal Church) has been listed for sale with Harvey Lindsay real estate company. The property is zoned institutional.

Norfolk Collegiate reported that the construction of its new arts center is on schedule for a March 2013 opening.

The group discussed the need for school crossing flashing lights at the Norfolk Christian Lower School on Granby Street and the Norfolk Collegiate Lower School on Tidewater Drive. This will be discussed further at the next task force meeting.

Controversy over Speedy Gonzalez redevelopment leads to break in civic league

For years Oakdale Farms, Denby Park, and Cottage Row Park have shared a civic league aptly titled "Oakdale Farms—Denby Park—Cottage Row Park Civic League" according to the city. It appears that a recent disagreement between the combined civic league and residents in the Cottage Road Park area about a proposed rezoning has resulted in a new civic league — Cottage Road Park Civic League.

The disagreement was over the proposed rezoning of 7482 Wellington Road which is to the rear of the Speedy Gonzalez restaurant on Tidewater Drive. The proposal was from Cook-Out Restaurant, a North Carolina BBQ chain that would have combined the Speedy Gonzalez property with 7482 Wellington Road. Cook-Out was proposing a 24 hour double drive-thru store.

The Oakdale Farms—Denby Park—Cottage Row Park Civic League voted in favor of the Cook-Out rezoning but residents on and around Wellington Road objected. The objections resulted in Cook-Out withdrawing their application for the rezoning and probably looking for a location elsewhere in the city.

Cottage Row Park Civic League leaders say the Oakdale Farms—Denby Park—Cottage Row Park organization voted to support the redevelopment over their objections. By taking the currently residential lot behind Speedy Gonzalez, all-night retail activity would have been brought closer to residents.

Despite support by the larger organization, Cottage Row Park neighbors garnered enough opposition that developers withdrew their rezoning request.

The new civic league meets at 7 PM on the first Monday of each month at the Plumbers & Pipefitters Local Union 110 Building, 520 Naval Base Road, Norfolk, Virginia 23505. Their first meeting is scheduled for October 1, 2012.

Suburban Acres Civic League's board of directors and civic league discussed the issue in July and August, respectively and reported to the planning commission that SACL had no objection to the development as long as traffic on the corner of Tidewater Drive and Stanley Street was adequately addressed; SACL leaders were unaware the surrounding residents had objections since the majority of the property was already zoned commercial, and the Oakdale Farms-Denby Park-Cottage Road Park Civic League supported the rezoning. SACL's traffic concerns were driven by the change from an inside dining and take out establishment to a double-drive-thru format.

Featured SACL Supporter Eggleston's Let's Go Pet Care

Eggleston is a local not-for-profit that creates education, training, and employment opportunities for adults with disabilities. Eggleston also operates group homes, day support centers, and outreach programs in the community. It helps disabled adults become more independent and have a better quality of life.

Through a variety of Eggleston-operated business enterprises, adults with disabilities get hands on job training and subsequent employment, either in an Eggleston business or private business. In addition to a large linen service operation, Eggleston employees also staff a food service support program, providing food service staff to military personnel in nine Eastern Virginia Navy and Marine Corps galleys through the Federal government's AbilityOne program. Eggleston also operates retail businesses like Tanners Creek Garden Center and Let's Go Pet Care in Riverview, both of which advertise in The Suburban.

I interviewed Geraldine Kerney, a Let's Go employee in September. Geraldine was previously in Eggleston's day support program when Eggleston staff noticed she really had a way with dogs during dog-walking visits from Let's Go Pet Care, which is next door to the day support center on LaValette Avenue.

Geraldine's day begins at 6 am. At 7 am she catches an HRT bus; after transfers almost two hours later she arrives at Let's Go Pet Care. Her job at Let's Go involves walking dogs to the park and bathing dogs. When business is slow she cleans.

According to Geraldine, some dogs like baths more than others. When asked what her favorite thing is about working with dogs she said, "Playing and calming them down, and giving them cookies and peanut butter." Let's Go staffer Stevie Gant

clarified that these are "doggie treats," not people cookies!

Geraldine gets off work at 1 pm and travels by bus to her godmother's home on Dumont Avenue. She also enjoys singing at a Ballentine nursing home in the afternoons. Geraldine said she started singing with her church people; she attends Great Hope Baptist Church in Chesapeake.

Let's Go Pet Care features pet bathing and nail clipping, and pet sitting and walking services. They are open 9-5 Monday through Friday, 10 to 4 Saturday, and 12 to 4 Sunday.



"Out of sight, out of mind" certainly applies to our sanitary sewer The cooler weather of fall means lawn chores and garage cleanouts. The fine folks at the Norfolk Department of Public Works provide these guidelines for following the City's rules for

trash disposal.

How to Talk Trash! – The City makes it easy to get information about waste disposal. At the following website or telephone number you can: 1) schedule a Bulk Waste Request for anything that doesn't fit in your green cart or excess yard waste; 2) request a replacement or second green trash or blue recycling cart; 3) find out what your recycling schedule is and request e-mail reminders of your recycling weeks; 4) sign up for the new Recycling Perks rewards program.

Yard Waste and Tires – Yard waste is collected on the same day as regular garbage collection. Place it at the curb (not in the street) no earlier than 5:00 pm on the day before collection and no later than 7:00 am on the day of collection.

Yard waste must be placed in clear plastic bags or a 30-gallon container. Yard waste placed in solid colored bags will receive a warning notice or fine and may not be collected.

Limbs and branches must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet long and no larger than 18 inches in diameter. Tree waste larger than this must be handled through a Bulk Waste Request. Up to 20 clear bags, 20 bundles, or 3 cubic yards of yard waste per household is accepted per collection. Amounts greater than 3 cubic yards must be scheduled through a Bulk Waste Request.

Collection of tires is limited to 4 tires per collection and 12 tires in one year.

Curbside Recycling – Collection is every other week on the same day as regular trash collection. Items do not have to be separated but no plastic bags are permitted.

Acceptable items include: newspaper, glass bottles (clear, brown and green), plastic bottles and jugs with recycling numbers 1 and 2 on the bottom, steel cans, unwanted mail,

Fax: (757) 441-2531 E-Mail: robert.mccabe@norfolk.gov Web Site: www.norfolksheriffsoffice.com cardboard (corrugated, cardboard and chipboard), magazines, telephone books, and aluminum cans, pie plates and foil. Shredded paper must be ribbon cut and placed in a paper bag to prevent litter.

Items NOT accepted for recycling: plastic bags, Styrofoam, yard waste, wide mouth plastic containers (like yogurt and butter containers), cross-cut shredded paper, scrap metal and glass (such as plate glass and mirrors).

Recycling materials that do not fit inside the blue cart may be taken to one of the Recycling Drop-off Centers, located behind Maury High School, or on Security Lane next to the Norfolk Technical Vocational School off North Military Highway.

Bulk Waste Pickups – The City has a special collection program to remove large bulky items such as appliances,

mattresses, furniture, excess yard waste, and other items that will not fit in the green cart. These special collections must be scheduled by 3:00 pm on the day prior to your normal trash collection.

Free Refuse Disposal – Norfolk residents (not businesses) may dispose of household trash, yard waste, bulk waste, and non-refrigerant appliances at no charge at the SPSA Transfer Station at 3136 Woodland Avenue (behind the SPCA on Ballentine Blvd.) on

Saturdays, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, and Sundays, 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Go to www.NorfolkTrash.com for further information on disposal requirements.

Sensitive Documents – The City will shred your sensitive documents for free, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at the Division of Towing and Recovery, 1195 Lance Road, off Lowery Road near North Military Highway. While-you-wait service is available for up to 100 sheets of paper, and drop-off service is available for up to a shopping bag full. Paper clips and binders must be removed.

Used Electronics – Small household appliances such as computers and printers, telephones, televisions, video games, hair dryers, flashlights, etc. may be taken to the E-Cycling Collection sites at: Division of Waste Management, 1176 Pineridge Road (Monday through Saturday, 10:00 am to 2:00 pm), or the Division of Towing and Recovery, 1195 Lance Road (24 hours a day, seven days a week).

Household Hazardous Waste – Any type of household hazardous materials such as old paints, automotive fluids, compact fluorescent bulbs, garden and household chemicals and cleaners can be safely disposed of at the Division of Waste Management, 1176 Pineridge Road (Monday through Saturday, 10:00 am to 2:00 pm). These materials may also be taken to the SPSA Transfer Station at 3136 Woodland Avenue on the first Saturday and fourth Wednesday of each month from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.

SACL to host home electronics recycling drop-off

Suburban Acres Civic League will host an e-cycling drop off point at 549 Carl Street (corner of Carl Street and Suburban Parkway) on Saturday October 20th from 9 am to 1 pm.

Most electronics also contain hazardous or toxic chemicals that can harm the environment or even be dangerous if buried with trash. TV sets and computer monitors contain lead; circuit boards and batteries contain chromium, cadmium, lead, and mercury.

Consumer electronics can be responsible for up to 40% of the lead found in landfills.

This e-cycling event will help Suburban Acres earn points in Norfolk's EARNN (Environmental Awards for Recycling in Norfolk's Neighborhoods) program.

Items accepted at the event include power supplies and battery backups, computers and monitors, television sets, cordless phones and cell phones, computer peripherals like mouse and keyboards, consumer electronics and appliances, cameras, camcorders, fax machines, VCR's and DVD players, household copiers and printers, connectors, cables, wiring, and other electrical and electronic

Norfolk has two e-cycling collection centers: The City Towing Facility at 1195 Lance Road collects 24-hours a day, 7 days a week. The Division of Waste Management facility at 1176 Pineridge Road is open Monday through Saturday from 10 am to 2 pm. Our e-Cycling drop off point saves you the trip! See you October 20th.
