SACL Web site draws more visitors in 2012

The Suburban Acres Civic League Web site had about 2300 individual views in 2012 through December 9th, according to Word Press, our site host. WordPress.com is a free, easy-to-use, blog-style site; the civic league pays a modest site hosting fee each year.

The busiest day of the year was November 8th with 69 hits (we had just posted the November newsletter, and days before that a link to photos of Hurricane Sandy damage in the neighborhood).

Of the five most viewed posts, three were new newsletter postings, one related to a public meeting regarding Wards Corner redevelopment, and an article relating to distracted driving from 2011.



Neighborhood Watch Update

Neighbors on Woodfin Avenue reported three vacant houses on Woodfin (behind Norfolk Collegiate) were broken into; copper piping of the water heaters and kitchen plumbing were taken overnight November 28/29.

According to the Norfolk Police Department offense reporting system, street robberies in areas adjacent to Suburban Acres are increasing. There have been reports of robberies to individuals in the Wards Corner area as well as the East Little Creek Road section between Wards Corner and Southern Shopping Center. Don't become a victim. Always be aware of your surroundings. Robberies often occur in shopping mall parking lots. Try to park in high-traffic, well-lit areas. Look around before you exit your vehicle. If you feel suspicious of nearby activity (people sitting in a car or just "hanging around"), move to another area of the



parking lot or leave the area. If possible, shop with a friend; there is safety in numbers. Have a safe and happy New Year.

W C Task Force gets update on Talbot Hall

The Mayor's Wards Corner Task Force convened for their monthly meeting on Thursday December 13th.

Dr. Jay Taylor represents a group of citizens who are trying to save Talbot Hall from development. The property consists of 6.5 acres and the house was built in the early 1800s. The Episcopal Diocese of eastern Virginia has hired Harvey Lindsey to study the disposal of the property, but it is not up for sale as of yet. The Foundation is looking for community support to preserve the property for some type of public use. For more information, go to: www.savetalbothall.org.

Alice Kelly reported from the Department of Public Works on undergrounding of utilities at Wards Corner. The group approved the design of the concrete support poles. The DPW will put in a budget request for the 2014 budget cycle to place the utilities on the southeast corner underground.

Wards Corner is one of several locations being considered by the City for red light cameras. Engineering designs are underway. When the cameras are installed, there will be a 30 day period during which traffic citations will not be issued.

DPW and the Norfolk School System will share responsibility for repairs of raised sections of sidewalks at Suburban Park Elementary. Work will be done over the Christmas break. DPW will repair the sections of sidewalk along the street; the school system will repair the sections around the perimeter of the school.

After evaluation, DPW is not recommending additional school zone lights for Norfolk Christian upper school on Thole or the lower school on Granby because the schools are some distance from the public schools they are near and school hours and holidays are different. They believe that additional police enforcement should help, noting that speeding violations in school zones carry a \$400 fine.

DPW will look at placing larger school zone signs on Thole Street at Norfolk Christian's upper school and the Norfolk Police Department will work with the school on tips for parents to improve traffic control.

Chuck Rigney gave a historical overview of the establishment of Wards Corner from the 1940s to today. No new information was presented other than what we have heard recently through Wards Corner Now about tenants.





Intermodal Connector to Link I-564 with Naval Station, NIT, future third crossing

A public meeting to solicit comments regarding the planned I-564 Intermodal Connector was held Tuesday evening Dec. 11th at Sewells Point Elementary School on Hampton Boulevard. The informal, informational session, held from 5 to 8 pm, was structured so visitors could move about among displays and maps, and ask questions of meeting representatives.

Representatives of VDOT, the Navy, City of Norfolk and Federal Highway Administration were available to answer questions.

Soliciting public input is a requirement of the National Environmental Policy Act in order to transfer land from the U.S. Navy to VDOT for the road. The Navy is preparing an Environmental Impact Assessment.

The planned four-lane divided connector, the first phase of the hoped for "Patriot's Crossing", or third crossing to the Peninsula, would extend from the existing Route I-564 on the east at the current International Terminal Boulevard ramp to Naval Station Norfolk's Virginia Avenue on the west. Going West-bound motorists would travel on a new road running parallel to I-564 between the interstate branch and Chambers Field; the new road would cross I-564 via a flyover just before the runway overpass and head West, crossing Hampton Boulevard at the site of the current Naval Station Gate 6. The western terminus of the connector would branch into a new, relocated Naval Station Gate 6,

Photo at left on page 6 shows terminus of proposed I-564 Intermodal Connector, at Naval Station Norfolk and NIT. The route bisects former Fleet Rec Park Little League fields

Norfolk International Terminals, and existing Naval Station Norfolk truck inspection station. Eventually travelers could continue on to the Patriot's Crossing.

The proposed road runs across the southern portion of the Navy's Fleet Recreation Park, which was home to the Fleet Park Little League for decades until the end of the 2011 season. The little league was evicted based on the Naval Station's 2009 Air Installations Compatible Use Zones (AICUZ) study, which concluded the fields were in a designated "clear zone", or likely crash zone near the approach to the Chambers Field Runway. The connector's proposed path bisects the site, running over the former T-ball fields.

When asked if the proximity to the clear zone made the proposed route dangerous, meeting representatives said the proposed route was located "just outside of" the clear zone.

The project is planned so that an Air Terminal Interchange could be added in the future for additional access onto the Naval Station.

The Federal Highway Administration is still taking comments on the project through January 11th. Comments and questions can be sent to Mr. Jack Van Dop, FHWA-EFLHD, 21400 Ridgetop Circle, Sterling, VA 20166, (703)404-6282, or by email to Jack.VanDop@dot.gov.

Planners hope to complete environmental assessment documents by Spring of 2013 and award a design-build contract by Summer 2013. The project is targeted for completion by September 2015.

Editor's Note: Since this story originally was posted on www.wardscornernow.com The Virginian Pilot has reported and Governor McDonnell announced that VDOT and the Navy have signed a Memorandum of Agreement allowing VDOT to move forward with the construction phase of the intermodal connector.



The newsletter, which focuses on neighborhood specific ideas and opportunities, is produced by the city's Communications Division and is sent to around 1,000 people in Norfolk who have participated in building strong neighborhoods in Norfolk in some way, including civic league presidents and officers, and city staff.

The article, excerpted at left, was distributed on December 14th and highlighted the civic league's partnership with Suburban Park Elementary School and participation in fundraising for school projects and holiday food drive.

The civic league has been an enthusiastic supporter of the mayor's Neighbors Building Neighborhoods program since its inception, and participated in the Front Porch Forum during the summer.

League officers are currently participating in a review of the city's rules governing neighborhood activities and special events.

January 2013 – A Green New Year's Resolution

“Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle” is a resolution that will help the environment and your pocketbook, and it doesn’t involve the size of your waistline!

The EPA estimates that in 2010 (most current data), Americans generated about 250 million tons of trash and recycled and composted over 85 million tons of this material, equivalent to a 34.1 percent recycling rate.

On average, we recycled and composted 1.51 pounds out of our individual waste generation of 4.43 pounds per person per day.

Those numbers mean that each year, the average Norfolk resident creates about 1620 pounds of waste – that’s almost a ton! Everything plastic – whether a plastic bag or bottle, synthetic fabrics and carpet, and even car parts – is made from hydrocarbons mined from oil, natural gas, or coal. Everything metal – from soda cans to silverware to vacuum cleaners – is made from metals mined somewhere in the world. Mining of hydrocarbons and metals not only uses up limited natural resources that can never be replaced, it also causes environmental and social disruption in many regions around the globe. So here are some things we can all do to help save our planet’s natural resources.

REDUCE – Before you buy something new, think about whether what you have can still serve a little longer. Think about whether you really do need the latest and greatest or the biggest and shiniest product on the market. And if you do need to buy something, look for products that are made with natural or recycled materials, are made locally, have minimal packaging, and are energy efficient.

REUSE – When it is time to get rid of something, think about whether it could be reused to serve a needy family for some

time longer. We have many thrift stores in our area that will take clothes and household goods, and many of them will pick up at your home. Even old clothing that is past the point of use can be recycled. Habitat for Humanity has a program that will take surplus or still usable construction materials (everything from sinks to siding) – they are located at 900 Tidewater Drive and can be reached at 640-0590 or www.shrhabitat.org. Some mailing stores will take back plastic packing peanuts, and grocery stores take back plastic shopping bags and newspaper bags.

RECYCLE – The recycling industry employs over 1 million workers nationwide and is a \$236 billion a year industry. Our local recycling saves space in the local landfills – something we all should be concerned about! And, every time you put out your recycling cart (even if it isn't full), the City "counts" your cart towards our neighborhood's participation rate for the EARNN program (Environmental Awards for Recycling in Norfolk Neighborhoods), and that earns us points towards our annual goal of getting \$750 from the City for our civic league.

The City's household waste recycling center at 1176 Pineridge Road in the Norfolk Industrial Park (Monday thru Saturday, 10 am to 2 pm) provides an opportunity to recycle even more waste. This site will take things such as old computers, TVs, electronics, batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, and household

such as pesticides and fertilizers, cleaning products, paint, and used automotive oil. For a complete list of materials this facility will accept and its location, call the City's Keep Norfolk Beautiful program at 441-1347 or go to www.NorfolkBeautiful.org and look under "Recycling and Trash Info."

Reduce, reuse, and recycle. That's one resolution that is easy to keep and helps the planet!
