Seniors, disabled can apply for tax relief

Norfolk seniors can apply for real estate tax relief through June 1st. The Norfolk Department of Human Services is accepting applications for the city's Real Estate Tax Relief/Deferral program. The program provides eligible senior and/or disabled homeowners in Norfolk a reduction in their real estate tax, or an option to defer a percentage of tax owed based on the home's average assessed value.

In order to qualify: residents must be 65 years of age or totally and permanently disabled, must live in the property, the combined income of owners and all relatives living in the home cannot exceed \$67,000 per year, and the senior's net worth, excluding the home, cannot exceed \$350,000.

On February 12, 2013, the City of Norfolk approved an ordinance that includes a cap of \$5 million in available funding for the program. Relief will be provided as an exemption or deferral up to the average assessment of \$203,386. Homeowners with income less than \$28,611 may defer taxes on amounts over \$203,386. Community information sessions will be held during April and May to assist residents with questions about the program and the application process.

Development, utilities updates at W.C. Taskforce meeting

The Greater Wards Corner Task Force met Thursday March 14th at Norfolk Collegiate School's new Center for the Arts.

Department of Public Works-John Keifer presented a briefing with handouts on the I-564 / Air Terminal Interchange project, which is a joint undertaking of the City, VDOT, the Virginia Port Authority, and the Navy. The project will take several decades and will improve vehicle access to the Naval base and International Terminals. Three of the five components of the project are complete or underway: relocation of the Fleet Recreation Park is complete, the Hampton Boulevard underpass will be completed in Summer 2013, and the relocation of I-564 will start in Fall 2013 and be completed in Fall 2016. Ultimately, it is hoped that the third crossing of Hampton Roads (known as Patriots Crossing) will tie in to I-564 and extend across Craney Island to the I-664 (Monitor Merrimac tunnel) crossing area.

An area field review warranted the recommendation of two new street lights at 7307 Yorktown Drive and along Galveston Avenue adjacent to 401 Virginian Drive in Suburban Acres. The

design for the lights has been submitted to Dominion Power for a cost estimate. Once received, the City will move forward with the installation – the process is expected to take about six months. The civic league requested these lighting updates.

Department of Development-Demolition is completed at the site of the new Suburban Park Shopping Center. The following commercial entities have executed a lease: Harris Teeter, Towne Bank, Sleepy's Mattress, Albano Cleaners, Subway, and Starbucks.

Rob Heavner of Retail Advisors will serve as the broker on real estate and leasing deals for the Midtown Shopping Center. Midtown management has completed over \$1.2 million in renovations. Additional parking lot improvements are planned for the spring. The Department of Development will continue to work with management on tenant and rebranding efforts.

Negotiations are underway for the retail space formally occupied by No. 1 Chinese Buffet in the Wards Corner Shopping Center. Possible replacements could be another restaurant or a dollar type store.

\$1 million in renovations/upgrades are near completion at the Wards Corner Farm Fresh. A special exception was granted to operate a drive-thru for their pharmacy. The Wards Corner location is one of the top producing grocery stores. Farm Fresh is selling the cold storage units behind their store.

Utilities-The anticipated completion date of the Louisiana Drive Water Main Replacement project is mid-April. The pipe replacement work in the median area of Granby Street south of Little Creek Road is being done by Virginia Natural Gas.

Neighborhood Watch Update

Craigslist and Ebay are both used by scammers.

Locally, some houses-for-rent and used car sales ads can be deceiving. Some local houses are listed for rent on Craigslist at a ridiculously low price. An e-mail reply will often result in the landlord requesting a deposit and first months rent paid by mail to an out of town address or wired to another city or country. They will also ask for personal information including bank account information to check your credit record.

DO NOT give out this information through an e-mail or over the phone. Insist on meeting in person at the address listed for rent. DO NOT carry the rent and deposit in cash to the meeting. Many people have been set up to be robbed or worse through these scams.

Also be aware that a lot of flooded cars are being sold in this area on Craigslist. Ask for a Carfax report and check out the title (most states stamp information on the title if the car has been flood damaged or totaled out by an insurance company.) However, you cannot always rely on this. If possible, have a trusted mechanic check out the vehicle prior to purchase.

Some sellers on Ebay are selling counterfeit items and coins. Only buy from sellers with a listed selling history and good reviews. If you pay through Paypal you can contest transactions that turn out to be bogus.

2013 Lafayette River Festival on April 27th

Lafayette RIVERFEST, a free, outdoor celebration promoting the restoration of the Lafayette River, is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, April 27. It has expanded to include a light-hearted contest for "spokesdogs" to promote "scooping the poop," as well as maritime history re-enactors. This is in addition to the more than 40 family activities that will be presented at the RIVERFest site in the 600-700 blocks of Mayflower Road, along the Colonial Place waterfront in Norfolk.

"Our community is making great progress bringing back the health of the Lafayette branch of the Elizabeth - in no small part because of the thousands who get involved through RIVERFest," says Marjorie Mayfield Jackson, executive director of Elizabeth River Project, which is co-presenter of the festival with the City of Norfolk and multiple sponsors and partners. At the 2012 Lafayette RIVERFest, the best environmental scores for the Lafayette in modern times were announced. An updated scorecard will be available at the festival "Science Dome" this year as well.

According to Jackson, Elizabeth River Project continues to recruit "River Star Homes" to do their part cleaning up the Lafayette River. To date, River Star Homes, initiated at the first Lafayette RIVERFest in 2011, encompass 1,300 homes.

The event will feature live music, children's activities, local food vendors and a silent auction for rain barrels painted by area school children.

April 2013 – You can Help the Lafayette River!

Did you know you live in a watershed? (And you thought you live in the Suburban Acres neighborhood!) “Watershed” is a term scientists use to define the area of land that drains into a particular body of water. Every yard and street in our neighborhood drains into the North Branch of the Lafayette River. The drainage areas you can see include the “ditch” that runs behind Kroger’s and up to Virginian Drive; the freshwater stream that runs along Parkdale Drive and the Archer’s Green apartments; and the tidal creek that runs through Granby Park to Norfolk Christian School. What you can’t see are the stormwater drains that run under our streets and enter these waterways. If you had a very tiny boat (or were a fish), you could travel from Kroger’s out the Lafayette to the Chesapeake Bay and then to the Atlantic Ocean.

But the Lafayette River is not a very clean river, which isn’t good for us and isn’t good for the critters that live in it. There are too many bacteria in the river, making it unsafe for us to swim or eat shellfish. Too many nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) enter the river from stormwater runoff when it rains, causing algae blooms that use up the oxygen in the water and can lead to fish kills.

Wherever you live, our entire neighborhood is closely tied to the Lafayette River, which has come to be called Norfolk’s “home river.” Here are some things you can do to help the efforts to clean it up.

Put nothing but rain down the storm drains. Anything that goes into the streets and storm drains – leaves, grass clippings, oil – will end up in the Lafayette. If you see a sewer overflow (bubbling water) in a street or a yard, call the City Department of Utilities’ emergency number at 823-1000.

Scoop the Poop! Pet wastes are a leading source of bacterial contamination of the Lafayette River. Pick up after your dogs when you walk them, and train your pets to use one specific area of your yard so that you can clean up easily and toss it in the trash.

Kick the fertilizer habit. Have your soil tested through the Norfolk office of the Virginia Tech Cooperative Extension Service (757-683-2816) to determine the health of your soil before applying fertilizer. Use compost as the preferred way to improve the soil, and let grass clippings stay on the grass. If you do fertilize, fertilize fescue grass only in the fall, and zoysia/St. Augustine lawns in the summer. Follow manufacturers’ instructions for application rates, and don’t fertilize if rain is in the forecast.

Don’t feed the geese and ducks. If we don’t feed them, they will move elsewhere to look for food. If you live on the water, you can string fishing line like a fence along the waterfront to

deter waterfowl from entering your yard. Better yet, let a buffer of native vegetation grow up along the shoreline to keep the waterfowl away.

Become a River Star Home. Join your neighbors and show your support for cleaning up the Lafayette River by displaying the blue River Star Home flag. Call the Elizabeth River Project at 757-399-7487 or visit their website at www.elizabethriver.org to join the “home team.” River Star Homes are eligible for a free consultation on the organic way to maintain your yard, and can receive grant funding for an organic “lawn makeover” whether or not you live on the water.

Participate in group efforts to clean up litter. The Suburban Acres **Great American Clean-Up** will be on April 27. After doing your part at our neighborhood clean-up, have fun at **RiverFest** along the Lafayette River in Colonial Place. See information elsewhere in *The Suburban* on these events.
