throughout the year to needy families and is managed by the Salvation Army in our area. By adding an additional \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$15, or \$20 to your monthly bill payment, the

billing systems of Virginia Natural Gas and Dominion Virginia Power will automatically recognize the overpayment as a donation to EnergyShare.

The **Help to Others (H2O)** program provides assistance in paying water bills and is also managed by the Salvation Army. H2O contributions can be made through your on-line EZ Pay of the Hampton Roads Utility Billing Service or on the Hampton Roads Planning District Commissions website.

The American Red Cross helps those in crisis after disasters, and is a major supplier of blood. For information on how to donate blood at our local Red Cross office go to the Red Cross web site (see side bar).

There are a wide range of non-profit and social service organizations that help those in need in our community. Some of these organizations can use volunteers and some can use financial support.
