## From the President by Kevin Janney

recent Virginian Pilot article highlighted the low number of contested races in South Hampton Roads in the upcoming November 5<sup>th</sup> general election. 12 of 20 constitutional officer positions have only a single candidate: 9 of 15 House of Delegates seats are unopposed.

I have come to expect many uncontested races for state delegate and senator seats. Gerrymandering of districts by the party in control leads to Republican lopsidedly Democratic districts where it is nearly impossible to unseat an And incumbent. the extraordinary amount of time and money to run an effective campaign discourages many

from running for delegate and senate seats.

We are fortunate in Norfolk that three of the four constitutional officer positions contested—a couple of them pretty hotlygiving voters a real choice on November 5<sup>th</sup>.

We are again fortunate that the one uncontested position—that of commonwealth's attorney—is occupied by an incumbent that is serving us well. As chief prosecutor Grea Underwood has not only run an effective enforcement and prosecution operation, but has focused on preventing crime in the first place, and engagement with citizens and the community. One example is the opening of the

Community Collaboration Center in Wards Corner.

And once again we are fortunate here in Suburban Acres to be able to meet and hear from, in person, all eight constitutional officer


> candidates at our meeting this month on October 14.

The Norfolk Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals is a private, no-kill humane society dedicated to fostering the human-animal bond to ensure that every adoptable companion animal finds a home. Mr. Blizard gave a presentation of the SPCA's operations and activities, and discussed recent controversy regarding catch, spay/neuter, and release programs for feral cats. The SPCA relies on donations. You can adopt, foster, get your animals spayed or neutered or vaccinated or be a volunteer. They have a full veterinary staff onboard; the veterinary clinic is open to the public.

Neighborhood Liaison: August Yard of the Month is the Derrenbackers at 436 Suburban Parkway. Old Business— Kevin Janney reported that a 'no thru trucks' sign will be restored to the section of Virginian Drive between Thole Street and Louisiana Drive when the shopping center developments sidewalk and curb improvements go in. The city is evaluating the civic league's request for single sided parking in the 100 and 200 blocks of Suburban Parkway.

**New Business**—Kevin Janney reported that Marsha Lockard and Chris Clagett, SACL's representatives to the Norfolk Federation of Civic Leagues, have been instructed by the SACL board of directors to inquire about the Federation's high checking account balance and any plans to expend funds, and about revising the Federation's purpose/mission statement. There are concerns the Federation is not adequately addressing issues as a representative of multiple civic leagues, or conducting programs and events that single civic leagues cannot accomplish on their own.

#### Good of the Order-

Merlynne Powell spoke of some recent property transactions and concern of subdividing lots into flag lots and the negative consequences flag lots and additional construction can have on views, property values, etc. Kevin Janney promised to research city ordinances regarding subdividing lots, and asked residents to forward any specific, known plans to him so the Civic League could be alert for Planning Commission public hearings.

## Collegiate asks to acquire part of Midfield Street right-of-way

Norfolk Collegiate School is preparing an application asking the city to permanently abandon an easement on Collegiate property that was once intended to accommodate a future cul-de-sac or vehicle turnaround on the northernmost end of Midfield Street.

At one time Midfield Street extended all the way to Suburban Parkway through the site of the Suburban Park Apartments, built in 1940. City Council closed and abandoned the section of Midfield Street on what is now Norfolk Collegiate property in June 1973 at the request of the holding corporation of the apartment community. The site now contains Norfolk Collegiate sports fields and tennis courts, and no traces of the old street remain.

The school is raising funds for improvements to the sports fields on the site, including installation of synthetic turf and increasing the size of two soccer fields to regulation length and width. Due to the cost of site preparation and installation of the synthetic turf, which will be laid over the Midfield culde-sac, Collegiate wants to ensure the city has no plans to ever actually build the cul-de-sac.

Collegiate trustee Chris Kanter says the school is working with the city and engineers to develop a comprehensive storm water drainage plan for the property.

According to Kanter at some point in the future the tennis courts will likely be relocated to property the school owns on Woodfin Avenue, and a new athletic support facility will be built where the tennis courts are currently located along Suburban Parkway. The tennis courts will be affected due to the increase to regulation size of the soccer fields.

A utility and drainage easement along the path of the old Midfield Street section will remain.

## General Election to be held November 5th

On November 5, 2013. Norfolk registered voters will vote for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, House of Delegates, Commonwealth's Attorney, Sheriff, Commissioner of Revenue, and Treasurer. Polls are open from 6:00 am until 7:00 Residents in the Suburban Acres Civic League neighborhood vote at Suburban Park Elementary School. Voters who are disabled, age 65 or older, or pregnant may vote in their car in the bus loop if brought by an assistant. Voters coming by bus should also ask the bus driver to drop them off in the bus loop. Able-bodied drivers are requested not to park in the bus loop in front of the doors so that the elderly, handicapped, and buses will be able to park there. Voters may park in the teachers' parking lots and on Galveston Boulevard. Voters may enter the school either by the front door (which is also the handicap access) or by the door to the gym. The longest lines for voting in our precinct are in the early morning; the slowest period is after 2:00 pm, with 5:00 pm - 7:00 pm being the slowest.

Voters must present one valid form of identification – generally a voter registration card, current driver's license or other government- or employer-issued photo identification card, or one of a number of other state-approved non-photo IDs. Please have your ID ready before you enter the school – this will speed up the voting process. Important: There will be no changes to Virginia's existing voter ID requirements until 2014. A newly enacted state law requiring photo identification will not take effect until July 1, 2014.

If you are not registered to vote, you have until October 15 to do so. You can now register or update your address and name information on-line. Voter registration applications, as well as information on absentee voting, can be found at the State Board of Election's excellent website at <a href="https://www.sbe.virginia.gov">www.sbe.virginia.gov</a>, or by calling the Norfolk General Registrar's office at 757-664-4353.

## Wards Corner public art proposals sought

The committee working to define desired elements for public art at Wards Corner has finished its work and the city's Arts Commission has issued a nationwide request for proposals (RFP) seeking artists with project ideas. In 2008 the Norfolk City Council approved the Percent for Art Funding Ordinance, assigning 1% of public project costs over \$500,000 to public art. Substantial city funding for infrastructure and traffic signal improvements is involved in the current revitalization of the Wards Corner shopping district, including undergrounding of utilities on the intersection's Southeast corner.

The RFP reads in part, "Revitalization of the once bustling Wards Corner shopping area is now underway. What was once known as the 'Times Square of the South' is being refurbished with a vibrant new mix of retail, entertainment and local services.

## New name announced for Wards Corner shopping center redevelopment

The new Harris Teeter anchored shopping center at the southeast corner of Wards Corner has a new name: K & K Square at Wards Corner.

K & K Toys, the partnership of K. R. Perry, his son Douglas Perry, and brother in law Macon Brock, began as a Ben Franklin variety store opened by K.R. Perry downtown in 1953, which later expanded to a location in Wards Corner. The variety store's name was changed to K & K 5 & 10. The partners started the K & K Toys mall store concept in 1970 at Wards Corner. The partners' "5 & 10" experience and popularity of toys

in the "5 & 10" pricing category was the basis of the future "everything for a dollar" concept that gave birth to Dollar Tree.

The "K & K" comes from the late Kenneth (K.R.) and his wife Kathryn Perry, also now deceased. Macon Brock has served as Chairman of the Board of Dollar Tree Stores, now a publicly traded company, since 2001.

The current redevelopment of the site is the project of Chris Perry, son of Douglas Perry and nephew of Macon Brock. Perry's company, Suburban Asset Management, is a real estate investment and management firm with properties including 26 shopping centers on the East Coast from Virginia to Florida.

The current tenant list for the new shopping center includes Starbucks, Subway, Great Clips, Moe's Southwest Grill,

Sleepy's Mattresses, Harris Teeter, Albano Cleaners, GNC, nTelos Wireless, and a vacant 2,100 square foot location. The out-parcel will be a TowneBank branch.

Harris Teeter and the rest of the shopping center tenants are expected to open in February 2014. TowneBank is expected to open in early summer 2014.


## Neighborhood Watch Update By Larry Tice

Residential occur burglaries Virginia every throughout day. Statistically, they occur during the day while people are at work. The usual method of operandi ("M.O.") is to knock at the front door and see if anyone is at home. If there is no response, the burglar or burglars will go to the back or side of the house and look for a way to get in. They break and climb through windows, they kick in doors, they crawl through



doggy doors. They will often try the doors first to see if they are unlocked.

Alarms are a good deterrent, but burglars will often enter the



house, steal items and leave before the police respond to the alarm. Be vigilant for strangers lurking around the neighborhood. Call 911 if you suspect that a home burglary is taking place. If the suspects are in a vehicle, get the license number. With all of the modern devices available to take pictures, cell phones, ipads, cameras, etc. try to get pictures of the suspects and vehicles if you can without putting yourself in harm's way. Remember, these suspects like to operate in neighborhoods where they feel comfortable. Let's make them feel very UNcomfortable in Suburban Acres!



## **Drug-Free Approaches for Headache**

Dr. Robinson finds that the root of many headache sufferers' pain is in the cervical spine instead of the head; headaches often indicate a hidden condition called vertebral subluxations. Subluxations result from misaligned vertebrae in the spine; when this occurs in the cervical spine (neck) it can spark chronic pain and limited mobility.

Research shows that chiropractic adjustments slash neck pain and headaches; one study concluded that 77 percent of all headache sufferers studied had a marked abnormality in their cervical spine curves.

To keep your neck posture perfect, post a sign in eyeshot of your computer or desk to remind you to maintain proper neck alignment. Dr. Robinson can teach you simple posture checks and exercises.

Medication overuse headache (MOH) is a significant cause of headache. Studies show that even over the counter medicines can instigate headaches, ironically guaranteeing more pain for those seeking pain relief. National Fire Prevention Week is October 6 - 12, although the entire month is a good time to learn more about preventing fires. With two serious house fires in our neighborhood within the past year, fire prevention should be on everyone's mind. At our house, the gas grill recently caught fire due to a build-up of grease in the drip pan. A nearby fire extinguisher prevented what could have been a gas explosion – and the end of

this column!

In Virginia, fire departments respond to a fire about every fifteen minutes, with an average of 115 deaths each year, mostly in homes. The National Fire Prevention Association

fifteen minutes, with an average of 115 deaths each year, mostly in homes. The National Fire Prevention Association says that two thirds of home fire deaths are in homes without smoke detectors or where the detectors are not working. The leading cause of home fires is unattended cooking, followed by heating equipment. Other major causes are faulty electrical wiring and lighting, smoking, and candles. Fires spread much more quickly than you might think. A couch fire can engulf a room in a matter of seconds. Even our grill fire got out of control in seconds.

These are fire prevention tips from Norfolk Fire and Rescue and the National Fire Prevention Association. For more in-depth information on preventing fires, go to <a href="https://www.nfpa.org">www.nfpa.org</a>.

Smoke Detectors – Every home should have at least one smoke detector on each level of the house (including basements and attached garages), and preferably, one detector inside and outside of each bedroom. Norfolk residents can request a free smoke detector, which will be installed by Norfolk Fire and Rescue, at 757-664-6616. Detectors should be checked monthly, and batteries should be replaced every six months when Daylight Savings Time comes and goes. Detectors must be replaced every 10 years; some brands now come with built-in batteries that do not need to be replaced and chirp at the end of 10 years. If you use oil, gas or wood heat, have a carbon monoxide detector as well.

**Escape Plan** – Every home should have an escape plan that includes two ways out from all locations. Houses with two floors should keep a fire escape ladder at a central window. The escape plan should be practiced twice a year (without using the escape ladder!). Practicing the escape plan is especially important if there are children or elderly in the home.

**Cooking** – Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop and while broiling!! If you must leave, turn off the oven. For a fire on the stovetop, put a lid over the pan. If the fire is inside the oven, turn the oven off. Never pour water on a grease fire. Keep a fire extinguisher mounted in the kitchen – inside the sink cabinet will keep the extinguisher handy.

**Heating** – Most home fires related to heating equipment are due to creosote build-up in chimneys. All equipment used for heating – furnaces, fireplaces, wood stoves, gas logs – should be checked and cleaned annually. Space heaters should not be used with extension cords and must be kept at least three feet away from any flammable materials such as curtains and furniture. If you have an old space heater that does not have an automatic shut-off feature in case it is tipped over, it's time to buy a new one.

Electrical Systems - Call an electrician if your home has cir-

cuits that routinely trip off or if light switches and outlets feel hot. These can be signs of overloaded circuits and faulty wir-Check electrical cords on lamps and appliances for cracks around the plugs and for worn or chewed areas. (Yes. pets and mice like to chew on cords.) It is critical to check cords behind curtains and furniture, since that is where most "short circuit" electrical fires start. Cords on antique and old lamps (you know you have some) should be replaced.




Avoid using extension cords, but if you must, make sure they are sized correctly. Replace old extension cords and ask for help at the hardware store to get the right size cord for the job.

**Outdoor Grilling** – Use grills at least 10 feet away from the house and never use them on balconies and porches. Keep a fire extinguisher nearby.

Smoking and Candles – If you smoke, smoke outdoors. Never smoke in bed or when sleepy. Put candles in containers that prevent tipping and blow them out when leaving the room and before going to sleep. Better yet, avoid candles altogether (the smoke can cause allergies and asthma); use realistic LED candles instead.




