Suburban Acres Civic League Meeting Minutes for February 10, 2014

Meeting called to order by President Kevin Janney at 6:30 pm with 25 plus members and visitors in attendance.

Pledge of Allegiance

January minutes approved without additions or corrections.

Guest Speakers—<u>Laurie Naismith, Meadowbrook Civic League</u>. Laurie spoke about the proposed development of the old Meadowbrook School (vacant) site on Little Creek, near Hampton Blvd. One of the proposals was to move the Fire Station across the street into the site of the vacant school. That Fire station is the oldest station in Norfolk. Another proposal is to build single family homes on the area. The Meadowbrook civic league was looking for our support of these proposals by asking us to sign a petition which Laurie brought with her the evening of the meeting.

Willie C. Randall, Democratic Candidate for the 100th House of Delegates District special election: He is running to take Lynwood Lewis's spot, which is now vacant. He spoke on education and jobs, specifically tax incentives for new business development. This has worked in North Hampton County and Mr. Randall also feels this would work for all in the 100th district.

Harris Teeter's Tim Kaetzel, co manager and Sean Ferguson, Customer Service Manager: They spoke about the opening on 19th February. There were many specials happening that day and the next couple of weeks. You can sign up for new VIC cards as well as receive many deals on HT items. They talked about a few of their programs like the Partners in Education, and recycling of plastic bags. They also spoke about their hours and mentioned they would close at midnight. No truck deliveries in the evenings. For at least the next 18 months, both Harris Teeter and Kroger will be open together. They also mentioned that there are bike racks available at the store.

Work on new neighborhood "gateway" at Granby Park underway

Improvements to the entry point to the Granby Park / Glen Echo Shores side of the neighborhood commenced in February with work on the Granby Park median at the intersection of Granby Street.

The median narrowed to a finger shape with a defined East-bound left turn lane into Norfolk Collegiate's property. Delivery trucks had difficulty navigating the narrow lane and cut-through, and the median's concrete ring was damaged and deteriorating. The city cut off the 'finger', rounded the median so it is symmetrical on both ends, and resurfaced the old finger area with new asphalt, resulting in a wider space to turn into Norfolk Collegiate.

A new green, Norfolk neighborhood sign has been ordered by the city, and should arrive in mid -April. The sign will announce, "Granby Park."

The Recreation, Parks, and Open Space (RPOS) Department is coordinating the removal of a diseased tree on the Granby Street end of the median, and the civic league will coordinate landscaping.

The project was approved as a Neighborhood Pride mini-grant.

Steve Collins has spearheaded this project, as well as doing quite a bit of follow up and work on the Thole Street medians, which have taken a beating by careless drivers. Neighborhood Development Specialist Carlton Ransome has kept us updated on this project with assistance from city engineers and public works staff.

Norfolk's Block-by-Block Neighborhood Pride Grant program is a resource that provides opportunities for residents engage with their neighbors to design, develop and implement their own neighborhood improvement ideas and projects.

Bloxom Jr. wins 100th District special election by wide margin

Eastern Shore businessman Robert S. "Rob" Bloxom Jr. won a special election to fill the 100th House of Delegates District seat of former Delegate Lynwood Lewis (now a state senator) on February 25th. Bloxom is the son of former Del. Robert "Bob" Bloxom Sr. who served as the 100th District Delegate for 25 years up to 2003, and also served as the Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry. Bloxom Jr. owns Bloxom Auto Supply in Mappsville, Shore Tire & Auto in Onley, and the Egret Point Seafood Company.

The Republican defeated Democratic nominee Willie C. Randall, an Army veteran and Eastern Shore businessman, with 60% of the 11,296 votes cast, the majority of which were on the Eastern Shore. Randall won Norfolk 52% to 48%, but Bloxom Jr. narrowly carried the Suburban Park precinct 163 to 160.

A cascade of moves and special elections began with the general election in November when Norfolk State Senator Ralph Northam was elected Lieutenant Governor as part of a Democratic sweep of statewide offices. After quickly-organized Democratic and Republican primaries, Democratic State Delegate Lynwood Lewis, who had just won won re-election in November, and Republican Norfolk businessman Wayne Coleman ran for Northam's seat in a January 7th special election. Lewis was heavily outspent by Coleman in the short campaign, but eked out a 9-vote win, which expanded to an 11-vote margin after Coleman requested a recount.

Reached by phone in Richmond Bloxom said his Norfolk constituents, "I'm glad to get over there and make some contacts." explained his first week in the General Assembly has been a whirlwind, having spent the first weekend in March cleaning up campaign signs, and reporting back to Richmond on March 3rd at 8 am for a committee meeting.

Bloxom was sworn in on February 26th, with only ten days remaining in the 2014 legislative session.


Bloxom has been assigned to the Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources, and Finance Committees.



Preliminary light rail extension routes reach naval base via Wards Corner

The third phase of the corridor planning process for a possible high capacity transit extension to Naval Station Norfolk is still in progress, with Hampton Roads Transit and the City of Norfolk taking public comments after a series of community meetings in February.

At the February public meetings attendees were asked to pick their preferred routes from maps showing 16 potential extension routes for The Tide light rail to Naval Station Norfolk, several of which pass through the Wards Corner area. The routes presented were based on feedback from HRT's second set of workshops in September, where citizens used string and push pins to identify corridors connecting key destinations.

No final alignment has been selected, but public comment should help narrow the alignment choices. According to HRT, routes that are "fatally flawed," for example routes requiring unreasonable feats of engineering or causing too much environmental damage, will be eliminated, further narrowing the alignment choices.

Route proposal number 4 is an extension of The Tide north along the Granby Street corridor from downtown. 4a, 4b, and 4c reflect three different route terminus options at Hampton Blvd. via Helmick Street, paralleling a planned Norfolk International Terminals/I-564 spur, and via Admiral Tausig Blvd. ending near Naval Station gates 1 and 2.

Possible routes numbers 7 and 8 would enter the Wards Corner area from the East near the Virginia Beach city line with route 7 following Military Highway and East Little Creek Road, and route 8 following the I-64 corridor; both possibilities cross Wards Corner following I-564 and Admiral Tausig Blvd. to the base.

Route number 5 enters Wards Corner from Tidewater Drive and I-64 but follows the same I-564 / Admiral Tausig Blvd. route to the base.

Route number 6 enters from the East via the Military Highway/ East Little Creek Road corridor, then follows West Little Creek Road to Hampton Blvd.

The Naval Station Norfolk Transit Extension Study (NSNTES) began in April 2013 to find the most reasonable and feasible alignments for a possible Tide expansion.

Neighborhood Watch Report Latest credit card scam


This scam is happening in the Midwest right now and moving across the country. In this scam, the callers do not ask for your card number; they already have it (for instance, after hacking a retailer's computer system, such as the recently publicized data thefts from Target and Sears).

The scam works like this: Person calling says - 'This is (name) and I'm calling from the Security and Fraud Department at VISA. Your card has

been flagged for an unusual purchase pattern, and I'm calling to verify. This would be on your VISA card which was issued by (name of bank). Did you purchase an Anti-Telemarketing Device for \$497.99 from a marketing company based in Arizona?' When you say 'No', the caller continues with, 'Then we will be issuing a credit to your account. This is a company we have been watching, and the charges range from \$297 to \$497, just under the \$500 purchase pattern that flags most cards. Before your next statement, the credit will be sent to (gives you your address). Is that correct?' You say 'yes'.

The caller continues - 'I will be starting a fraud investigation. If you have any questions, you should call the 1-800 number listed on the back of your card and ask for Security.

Here's the IMPORTANT part on how the scam works- The caller then says, 'I need to verify you are in possession of your card'. He'll ask you to 'turn your card over and look for some numbers'.

Meadowbrook residents kept in dark on redevelopment

The City of Norfolk solicited requests for proposals for the site of Meadowbrook Elementary School without contacting or consulting the Meadowbrook Civic League, which might have provided helpful input on parameters for future redevelopment. The city received three development proposals, none of which meet the criteria outlined in the civic league's position statement, primarily

due to the residential density of the proposals, and lack of enough green space being maintained.

A public forum was held on February 19th after inquiries and disappointment was expressed by the Meadowbrook Civic League. The smallest of the three proposals will result in 22 single-family homes, the largest specifies up to 90 apartment units.

The former Meadowbrook School, shuttered in 2009, is on Preservation Virginia's 2011 list of Most Endangered Historic Sites in Virginia.

Meadowbrook Civic League is collecting signatures on a petition to encourage City Council to limit development to single family homes and maintain some green space on the site. The league's

The Wards Corner Civic League has publically indicated their support for Meadowbrook.

March 2014 - Talking Trash

The return of spring (finally) means lawn chores and garage cleanouts. The fine folks at the Norfolk Department of Public Works provide these guidelines for trash disposal.

How to Talk Trash! – The City makes it easy to get information about waste disposal. At the following website or telephone number you can: 1) schedule a Bulk Waste Request for anything that doesn't fit in your green cart or excess yard waste; 2) request a replacement or second green trash or blue recycling cart; 3) find out what your recycling schedule is and request e-mail reminders of your recycling weeks; 4) find out about the Recycling Perks rewards program at the Norfolk Cares Center (664-6510) or www.NorfolkTrash.com.

Yard Waste and Tires – Yard waste is collected on the same day as regular garbage collection. Place it at the curb (not in the street) no earlier than 5:00 pm on the day before collection and no later than 7:00 am on the day of collection.

Yard waste must be placed in clear plastic bags or a 30-gallon container. Yard waste placed in solid colored bags will receive a warning notice or fine and may not be collected. Up to 20 clear bags, 20 bundles, or 3 cubic yards of yard waste per household is accepted per collection. Amounts greater than 3

cubic yards must be scheduled through a Bulk Waste Request.

Limbs and branches must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet long and no large than 18 inches in diameter. Tree waste larger than this must be handled through a Bulk Waste Request.

Lawn and tree service contractors are responsible for removing the yard waste they generate. Collection of tires is limited to 4 tires per collection and 12 tires in one year.

Curbside Recycling – Collection is every other week on the same day as regular trash collection. Items do not have to be separated but no plastic bags are permitted.

Acceptable items include:

TALKINGTRASH

newspaper, glass bottles (clear,

brown and green), plastic bottles and jugs with recycling numbers 1 and 2 on the bottom, steel cans, unwanted mail, cardboard (corrugated, cardboard and chipboard), magazines, telephone books, and aluminum cans, pie plates and foil. Shredded paper must be ribbon cut and placed in a paper bag to prevent it from blowing away.

Items NOT accepted for recycling: plastic bags, Styrofoam, yard waste, wide mouth plastic


containers (like yogurt and butter containers), scrap metal and glass (such as plate glass and mirrors).

Bulk Waste Pickups – The City has a special collection program to remove large bulky items such as appliances, mattresses, furniture, excess yard waste, and other items that will not fit in the green cart. These special collections must be scheduled by 3:00 pm on the day prior to your normal trash collection at the website or phone number above.

Free Refuse Disposal – Norfolk residents (not businesses) may dispose of household trash, yard waste, bulk waste, and non-refrigerant appliances at no charge at the SPSA Transfer Station at 3136 Woodland Avenue (behind the SPCA on Ballentine Blvd.) on Saturdays, 8 am to 4 pm, and Sundays noon to 4pm. Go to www.NorfolkTrash.com for further information on disposal requirements.

Sensitive Documents – The City will shred your sensitive documents for free, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at the Division of Towing and Recovery, 1195 Lance Road, off Lowery Road near North Military Highway. While-you-wait service is available for up to 100 sheets of paper, and drop-off service is available for up to a shopping bag full. Paper clips and binders must be removed.

The After Parade Party is presented by the Columbian Club of Ocean View, and starts after the parade at noon at the Knights of Columbus Lot featuring live bands, as well as food and refreshments.

The one-and-a-half mile route starts at Northside Middle School and proceeds north on Granby Street, turns left on A View Avenue, then left on First View Street, and ends at the intersection of First View and Government Avenue.

Limited parking is available along some side streets near the route, but is also available at the Ocean View Beach parks and Ocean View Elementary School. The Parade is presented by Knights of Columbus, Council 3548.
