Letter from the President

For this edition I will borrow from a message recently sent by our Commander Navy Region Mid-Atlantic Chief of Staff, Captain Robert Geis.

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service. There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day.

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on 30 May 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is

now celebrated in almost every State on the last Monday in May.

Traditional observance of Memorial Day has diminished over the years. Many Americans nowadays have forgotten the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day. Some people think the day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our country.

I know we all know differently. I know many of us personally know someone who gave their life in defense of this great nation. More than a million Sailors, Soldiers, Marines, Airmen and Coastguardsmen have made the ultimate sacrifice since the Civil War. These men and women served their country fighting for the freedom that we all enjoy in the United States and they died knowing they were doing something that truly mattered. President Kennedy said "a nation reveals itself not only by the men it produces but also by the men it honors, the men it remembers." So let us remember, let us honor them.

Suburban Acres Civic League Meeting Minutes for April 13, 2015

Meeting called to order by President Kevin Janney at 6:30 pm at Suburban Park Elementary. There were 20 members and family, and 2 quests present.

Pledge of Allegiance

The 9 March 2015 meeting minutes were approved without correction.

Community Resource Officer Report - Officer William Old, III.

There were 4 incidents noted. In the 7500 Block of Granby a Granby High student's cell phone was stolen at Starbucks. On March 26 on Thole Street, a roommate moved the TV and cable into their room and another roommate thought the equipment was stolen. On March 27 there was a larceny on Cromwell (money taken from a purse). The victim believed a visiting nurse stole the money. On April 8 a backpack taken from school.

Concerns from members: There are concerns about the Health Care scam reported in the newsletter. The CRO had no updates.

Officer Old asked the members if there was interest in doing something at the June meeting for the National Night out.

Program - Guest Speaker Senator Lynwood Lewis

He mentioned the upcoming Veto Session, and gave a recap of the general assembly session. Sen. Lewis spoke of needed SOL reforms, reducing the number of tests so teachers are not forced to teach only to the SOL instead of really teaching. Senator Lewis spoke about the Ethics reform and changes to the amendments. He also answered attendee's questions about transportation, other bills being considered, successful legislation he sponsored to cut down on tunnel hold ups at the HRBT, coastal resiliancy legislation, and Veterans' issues.

Program – Guest Speaker Tim Mansfield, Norfolk Master Gardeners (EARNN Speaker) Tim spoke about projects at the Hermitage, volunteering at Botanical Gardens, putting in rain gardens and the River Star Homes projects. There will be plant sales at Botanical Gardens throughout the year as well as the Stockley Gardens Spring Art Show. Tim spoke about how to cut certain grasses. For example, Fescue should be cut at 3 inches only after July 4th. Plant the Fescue in the Fall, not the spring or early summer like Bermuda. He spoke about trying to bring back the Monarch Butterflies. There has been a shortage due to the lack of the milkweed plant in the area. He brought seeds for everyone to plant. The monarchs lay their eggs on the milk weed as well as feed off the milkweed plants. If you have these plants, do not pull them out. If you put seeds in or plant the milk week, plant it in full sun. Cut back in September. He talked about growing catnip to kill mosquitoes versus spraying chemicals.

Committee Reports -

Liaison-Nothing to report

<u>Treasurer</u>-Mary Ann Grogan reported we collected membership dues for 2 singles and one family. Total treasurer report amount was \$709.62

<u>EARNN</u>- Steve Collins was not at the meeting but he passed the following information: We will receive 15 points for the clean-up on April 18th because we have youth engagement. Normal clean-ups are 10 points for our two spots. We are also looking at receiving 30 points for our recycle bin set out. We are over 74% right now which is great! At the meeting on the 13th we have another EARNN speaker booked for the May 11 meeting, which will give us points towards EAARN. So come on out for some great information and great refreshments! All in all we are looking at receiving the top amount of cash rebate for the civic league for our EAARN efforts this year. Keep up the great work and thank you Steve Collins.

Old Business -

Refreshment help is still needed for upcoming meetings.

New Business -

A new business called Your Pie is slotted to go in next to the Harris Teeter at Wards corner. The owner will be Jeff Rhodes and he hopes to open up sometime this summer as well as plans to expand to other locations in the Hampton Roads area. Wards Corner Gateway art installed

The new public art for the Wards Corner Gateway was installed on the median on Granby St., near North Shore Rd. in early May. Additional work around the sculpture's base, landscaping, and lighting remains to be completed.

In what was a very lengthy collaborative process with the artist, the Norfolk Commission for the Arts, Wards Corner Art Subcommittee selected artist Gordon Huether to design and fabricate the public art installation.

The vision of the subcommittee was to develop a concept that embraces local identity, fosters a strong sense of place and creates a significant gateway. The installation enables viewers, to pause and reflect about the continued positive and exciting changes taking place in the neighborhood.

The Wards Corner Gateway installation is made up of two components: a bird-like structure inspired by the famed

intersection where Alfred C. Ward once operated his iconic general store, and a polished aluminum base. The large wing-like component features a black and white aerial photograph ٥f the Wards Corner intersection taken by a Virginian Pilot photographer in 1956. This part of the installation is made of translucent polycarbonate. The wing-like component is then mounted atop an eleven-foot tall aluminum base, which causes the 'Wing' to point toward the sky.

Wards Corner Gateway will be illuminated at night, featuring programmable color-changing lighting.

The installation and its

upward orientation references this neighborhood's future: its continued upward growth and development in cultural, economic and community matters.





May 2015 - Green Your Lawn...the Right Way

Warm weather brings those lawn care duties. Whether you do it yourself or hire a lawn care company, here are do's and don'ts for a good lawn while protecting the Lafayette River. No matter where you live, our entire neighborhood drains into the river through streets, storm drains, and ditches.

Get your soil tested. Before applying fertilizer, have the soil tested. Applying fertilizer when it isn't needed will just result in it being washed into the river, leading to algae blooms and fish kills. The Virginia Cooperative Extension Service will analyze your soil for a small fee and tell you the proper amount of fertilizer or lime to use. Call their Norfolk office at 757-683-2816 to find out how to get a soil sample mailing box. Most garden centers also have the boxes.

Know what kind of grass you have. The kind of grass you have determines the right time of year to apply fertilizer. If your grass stays green all year (unless you plant annual rye), it is a "cool season" grass, most likely fescue. If you grass turns brown in the winter, it is a "warm season" grass and is either zoyzia, Bermuda or St. Augustine.

Apply the right fertilizer, at the right time, in the right **amount.** We tend to apply way too much fertilizer to our lawns, thanks to all the advertising by fertilizer companies. If your lawn does need fertilizer, once a year is enough. Fall is the proper time to fertilize fescue lawns, not spring. Zoyzia, St. Augustine, and Bermuda lawns should be fertilized in early to mid-summer. Check the weather forecast and don't apply fertilizer if rain is expected, since rain will wash the fertilizer into the storm drains - and you will have wasted your money. A better alternative to chemical fertilizer is to use a thin layer of compost on your lawn

in the fall. Compost will add nutrients and improve soil quality as it decomposes.

Don't give the lawn a buzz cut. Grass should be kept at 2-3 inches high all year. Taller grass means deeper roots and stronger plants. Stronger plants are better at handling drought, insects and diseases. Tall grass also helps shade out weeds.

Let grass clippings stay. Don't bag up and toss clippings or blow them into the street. Grass

clippings decompose quickly and serve as a natural fertilizer each time you mow. If the clippings are too thick to leave on the grass, use the lawnmower's bagger and put the clippings in the compost pile or around vegetable and flower beds.

Use herbicides and pesticides sparingly, if at all. Maybe we can live with a less than perfect lawn and still win Flora the mermaid Yard of the Month! These toxic chemicals can have

Neighborhood Watch Report

The Suburban reported in April that elderly residents are being "targeted" by scammers. The scam attempts are apparently continuing. An elderly neighbor on Kirby Crescent was targeted again on April 28. A short, black, chubby woman with a sweater wrapped around her waist knocked on her door. The neighbor didn't open the door, and spoke through the window. The woman asked, "can you help me I'm new in the



neighborhood I just dropped off my daughter at Suburban Park Elementary, she goes to the MS program."

The woman then started crying dramatically, "I just need some information, can I walk to shore drive from here."

The neighbor opened the door at this point, but not the screen door. The conversation ended when the neighbor said she couldn't help her. At this point she was suspicious about the whole ordeal.

The SACL Neighborhood Watch reports there is a 2-1-1 number operated by the Virginia Department of Social Services for people who need assistance. Potential scammers can be referred to an agency which can actually help them with food, transportation, etc. just by calling 2-1-1.

Remember you can always call the Norfolk Police Department non-emergency number to report suspicious persons and provide tips at 441-5610, or just dial 9-1-1 if you feel threatened or the situation is urgent.

Norfolk City School Board Announces Superintendent Search

The Norfolk City School Board will begin the superintendent search process by seeking public input on qualifications for a new superintendent.

The School Board has created a survey for superintendent criteria, available at twww.surveymonkey.com/r/NorfolkSupt and will be made available on the school division's home page. Hard copies of the survey also will be made available at the Central Administration Building (800 E. City Hall Avenue, Norfolk, 23510), every school in the division, public libraries, and other outlets throughout the city that will be announced.

In addition to the survey, the board will hold four public hearings and two "chat and chew" sessions to receive input. The first public hearing is May 20, 2015 at 6:00 pm, Central Administration Building, 12th Floor, 800 E. City Hall Avenue. This hearing will be held prior to the Board's regular monthly meeting scheduled for 7 pm. Speakers are asked to sign up in advance by calling the Clerk of the Board at 628-3994 or by email at schoolboard@npsk12.com. Speakers may sign up at the hearing until 6:30 pm.

Other public input sessions include a Chat & Chew session on Tuesday June 2 at noon at the Norfolk Technical Center, 1330 N. adverse effects on children, pets, pollinators, wildlife, and waterways. Always read and follow label directions - and never use more than the recommended amount. A green alternative to herbicides for the lawn is a product made out of corn gluten, which keeps weeds from germinating. This product can be found at garden centers, where they can tell you the right way to

Talk to your lawn care company. Make sure they follow these measures when taking care of your lawn. Not all companies are certified under the Virginia Water Quality Agreement Program. If your company isn't, then it's up to you to make sure they "do no harm" to our children and pets, and the environment.


